

Questions in Context:

The Republican Presidential Primary Debates
Through NBC News (11/8)

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Overview

In past presidential elections, the Winston Group has analyzed the primary and general election debates to build a picture of how the topics covered interact with what voters have said — through surveys and exit polls — are their greatest concerns and the issues that are the most important for them in choosing for whom they will vote.

The following report continues our analysis for the Republican primary debates in anticipation of the general election next fall. This report covers the third Republican Primary Debate, hosted by NBC News on November 8, 2023. Topics covered include the distribution of issue topics in the debate questions, the number of questions asked of specific candidates, and candidate speaking times.

Qualified candidates for the NBC News November 8 debate were former Governor of New Jersey Chris Christie, Governor Ron DeSantis of Florida, former South Carolina Governor and ambassador Nikki Haley, businessman Vivek Ramaswamy, and Senator Tim Scott.

Debate Topics

The chart on the next page shows the distribution of questions by topic area. For the purposes of comparability, we re-use the same topic categories from our debate reports for the 2016 Republican primary and general election debates and the 2020 Democratic primary and general election debates. The exception is the "Presidential Fitness" category, which is a new category that covers questions such as whether presidents should be required to pass mental or physical acuity tests in order to serve.

Most of the topics are self explanatory, but for a few, definitions may be helpful. The "electability" topic area includes questions addressed directly to a candidate about his/her ability to attract a large portion of the electorate (for example, asking a candidate about his/her standing in the polls or statements he/she made that have raised questions), while the "other candidates" topic area refers to questions that directly ask one candidate about another candidate's past, policies, or prospects. If however the lead-in to a question refers to another candidate's policies but the substance of the question is that candidate's own positions, the question would be categorized according to the issue area. The "For Fun" topic area includes unusual topics or lighthearted questions aimed at letting viewers see more of a candidate's personality. "Social Security/ Retirement" consists of questions that address that topic as a separate individual retirement benefit issue — other entitlements questions fall under "Spending/National Debt." "Energy/Environment"

has been expanded to "Energy/Environment/Climate Change." "Social Issues" has been renamed to "Social/Cultural Issues." Given the breadth of the Social/Cultural issues category, we break this out by sub-category to get a better sense of the specific content of questions that may drive the debates.

Questions asked multiple times of different candidates are not counted more than once.

Topic Subcategories

Because of the potentially broad nature of some of the question categories, some additional clarification may be helpful.

Foreign Policy/National Security

Foreign Policy/National Security, the dominant category in the NBC News November 8 debate and accounting for about 1 in 5 questions overall, includes questions on China, Ukraine, and a subtopic that emerged following the attack on Israel on October 7, the Middle East.

Immigration

The broad topic of immigration, which has accounted for almost 13% of the questions so far, can be further subdivided into questions pertaining to border security (including questions about drugs coming from across the border), and questions pertaining to immigration policy itself, such as questions about DACA.

Social/Cultural Issues

"Social issues," about 22% of all questions asked in the NBC News November 8 debate, and about a fifth of the questions asked across both debates so far, includes a variety of subcategories, such as abortion, crime/guns, or LGBTQ+ issues.

To Whom Were Questions Directed?

"Number of Questions" refers to questions directed by a moderator at a particular candidate and includes questions that were asked of all candidates - so totals may differ from the charts above. "Number of Rebuttals" includes any times the moderator addressed a follow-up or rebuttal opportunity to a candidate, or a candidate broke in and gave a rebuttal to another candidate's answer on their own initiative. Given the difficulty of quantifying rebuttals and counter-rebuttals in high-tempo debate discussions, the "Rebuttals" column should be viewed as a reasonable estimate of what occurred in a given debate. While direct questions are somewhat easy to count, rebuttals and counter-rebuttals are somewhat more difficult to quantify, given the nature of the cross-talk that can occur when multiple candidates are on stage. Generally speaking, complete sentences or thoughts were counted as rebuttals, while, for example, single-word attempts to jump into the conversation were not.

"Percentage of Direct Questions" a candidate received comes from only questions directly addressed to a candidate or those addressed to all candidates, while "Percentage of Answers" includes all opportunities a candidate had to speak, including rebuttals, as described above. The "Percentage of Answers" comes out of the total of all answers given — not the total questions asked — so once again, the totals differ.

Questions Asked Of All Candidates

The following table highlights the questions that the moderators asked of every single candidate as well as the topic area of the question. Of note, the moderators appeared to take special care to make sure every candidate had an opportunity to speak on a given topic, even if they did not pose the question to each candidate in exactly the same way. For this reason, multiple questions may be captured in this chart from that debate.

Conclusion

One of the first noteworthy elements of the NBC News November 8 debate was that the moderators did not allow candidates to interrupt or speak over each other, and with a few rare exceptions, they did not allow candidates to rebut other candidates if their names were invoked in a negative light. Relatedly, the moderators seemed to take special care to ensure that all candidates had the opportunity to speak on almost all the questions. Having only five candidates on the stage may have also helped ensure that each one had an opportunity to speak. In our opinion, this created the conditions for a more substantive debate.

In terms of the topics covered, there were two categories that dominated the questions. These were Foreign Policy/National Security (about 39% of all questions asked in this debate) and Social/Cultural Issues (about 22%). In this debate, there was no dominant subcategory in either of these questions, with China, the Middle East, and Ukraine getting roughly equal coverage in Foreign Policy, and questions about abortion balanced with other Social/Cultural Issues questions.

Overall, Social/Cultural Issues and Foreign Policy/National Security are also the dominant question categories across all the debates, together accounting for about 40% of all questions asked. The economy, the consistent priority for voters, comes in at about 12% of the questions asked across all three debates.

However, another set of numbers worthy of consideration are the ratings for the debates. The NBC News November 8 debate had 7.5 million viewers, down from 9.5 million for the Fox Business September 27 debate. The first debate, hosted by Fox News, drew 13 million viewers.
